In our last edition (*Fall, 2024*), our Curator, Sue Rohde, posted an article about the Azalea Lace bug. This is a type of tiny flying insect that attacks Azaleas and Rhododendrons. They feed on chlorophyll, resulting in yellow, mottled-looking leaves. The plant will die from a bad infestation of Lace Bugs (Stephanitis pyrioids). Sue talked about chemical vs natural methods of control. The first step, however, is identifying the insects and destroy them before they can lay eggs.

Second Saturdays at DHA

Fascinating Fasciation

Have you ever walked along, minding your thoughts, only to be distracted by an odd-looking flower or plant? So odd that it made you wonder, "How is this possible? It might be that you were lucky enough to find a rare instance of fasciation, or in other words, mutation. This is not the same thing as a hybrid, which is produced through cross pollination. Fasciated plant stems may look wildly out of proportion, or a flower might be bicolored or shaped in a weird way.







This happens when an injury occurs to cells in a forming bud (leaf, stem, or flower bud) often from insect damage, at just the right stage of cellular development. It's uncommon because more often, the damaged part just dies off. In rare cases, cells undergo fasciation, and growth may continue, but with damaged DNA. As the bud matures, it only has part of the genetic code needed to form normally. The only part that becomes fasciated, is where the damage had occurred while in the bud stage. The rest of the plant is perfectly normal. If you harvest seed from a fasciated plant it will not pass on mutations.





Friend in the Spotlight

This time, instead of spotlighting one of our volunteers, we wanted to honor our long-time friends, Lane and Francine Shetterly. Lane was one of the first in our town to take an interest in our little arboretum. His parents, Ken and Agnes, were

some of our earliest volunteers, weeding and working on hands and knees. Lane has often helped us with legal questions while he was working as the city attorney. He and Francine have donated often to the arboretum that we all love!

Lane accomplished much in many layers of service as an attorney, a legislator, board member of the Dallas Community Foundation, and involvement with non-profit organizations. Although retired, Lane still serves in a Governor appointed position for Oregon.

A personal memory of mine was meeting with Lane at the Capital in Salem. He was there as a legislator and supporter of the 4-H Equine program, of which I was a co-leader. Lane has always worked for good causes that help people as if we were all good neighbors.
